On August 4, 2023, Anita passed


never be filled. Though her departure from this world was sudden, her impact on the lives she touched will forever be remembered with fondness and gratitude.






Megan has been really busy



MIDSOUTH BAND

hen it comes to Christian Country legends, Midsouth definitely qualifies for that title. This trailblazing band pushed the popularity of Christian Country music forward in the late 80s and 90s. During that time, Christian and Country music merged with their faith-based lyrics and Country influenced sound that has been a driving force in our genre for over three decades. Midsouth became a driving force in a developing genre known as Christian Country.

Midsouth began their recording career with Morningstar Records in the mid-80s. They were offered an exclusive agreement with Word Records in 1989 and recorded three projects. The band became a cross-over success when their music did well in both markets of Christian and Country music. In 1994, the band signed with Warner Alliance, a division of Warner Brothers, where they recorded two more projects that continued to be accepted across multiple genres of the music industry.

Midsouth toured heavily and had a very successful run as a band until deciding it was time to leave the road in 1997. Since that time, the band has continued to get together for special occasions for their strong fan base throughout the country who continue to love their special brand of music.

The band was originally founded in the 70s. They were known as The Mid South Boys, a Southern Gospel group based out of Sheridan, Arkansas. During the early eighties, the original members of the group had left. It was at that time that the group was purchased by Texas native, Robby McGee. He was raised with the music of The Eagles, The Gatlin Brothers, and Alabama, to name a few. Robby joined up with bandmate Bobby Bowen from Arkansas, who happened to have been heavily influenced by Kenny Hinson and Tony Turner, who had been raised in the Bluegrass state of Kentucky. Kent Humphrey, who was raised under many of the same musical influences, would later join the band to share the lead vocals with Bowen. McGee was the primary songwriter of the band. It didn't take long for the band's



signature Country sound to catch the attention of the growing Christian Country industry and the fans.

Midsouth has been blessed to experience many memorable highlights in their music career. Members of the band recall these special moments. "Due to the style of our music, we've performed in many venues not typically accustomed to Gospel music, and with many popular Country artists such as Willie Nelson, Charlie Daniels, Ricky Skaggs, Highway 101, and Colin Raye, just to name a few. Some of our more memorable moments would be the first time we heard our music on the radio, having our music videos run on CMT and other outlets; performing live on Ralph Emory's "Nashville Now" show with Barbara Mandrell, Minnie Pearl and George Jones; performing God Bless America for the Dallas Mavericks; having the opportunity to attend the Grammys in 1992 for the nomination of our "Shoulder To Shoulder" recording; and our song Without You (I Haven't Got a Prayer) crossed-over as a Top 30 Pop hit in Billboard Magazine and ultimately won a Dove Award."

Since those early days, Midsouth has seen many ups and downs of the music industry. The band shares some insight during their time on the road. "From a luxurious bus to a broken-down bus; a beautiful venue to a flatbed trailer; greatest sound ever to worst sound ever; celebrating chart songs to radio bombs; record company signs, record company drops. The music industry can definitely be rewarding and challenging at the same time. However, having said that, there's nothing like stepping onto a stage and seeing people clap their hands, sing along with your music, and talk to you like you are one of their dear friends (even though you've never met). That feeling, along with hearing how our music has and continues to impact people's lives all across the country are two of the most rewarding experiences (and gifts) that a music career could ever give."

Midsouth has received several accolades beginning with their 1985 'Newcomer of the Year' award. They received a Grammy nomination in 1992 for their "Shoulder to Shoulder" project, received several Christian Country Music Association awards, and won a Dove award for 'Country Recorded Song of The Year' in 1995 for the song, *Without You (I Haven't Got A Prayer)*. Most recently, the band received the 'Living Legend' award from The Inspirational Country Music Association.

In September of 1988, tragedy struck the band when one of their members, Robby McGee, had a scuba diving accident that left him paralyzed from the chest down. The doctors did not give him much hope of walking, playing his keyboards or singing again, and for Robby and his wife to be able to have children. However, after spending four months in the hospital, God was faithful and Robby was able to walk, play, sing, and come back on the road with the band. It was also during those four months in the hospital, at the verge of wanting to quit, that God gave Robby a song that has gone on to become arguably the most impactful one to someone going through a difficult season of life. The song was titled

Don't Give In. A little less than a year after the accident, God blessed Robby and his wife Vanessa with a son.

Midsouth states, "Our mission and goals are pretty simple; to bring glory to God in all that we do! Whether it's through our everyday lives out in the marketplace throughout the week, performing our music on a stage, through a song we've written, or anything else, we want the goodness of God to be so evident, that others are drawn in."

When you have the pleasure to attend a MidSouth concert, expect to laugh, dance, smile, and clap along with a stage full of talented musicians, singers, and writers who's music will leave you feeling encouraged and inspired and ready to pass it on to others!

Midsouth is excited to bring an upcoming event to their fans. "On October 27th at Landmark Church in Cincinnati, Ohio, we will not only be doing a live performance but we will also be making that performance a Pay Per View event! We want to be able to play all of our hit songs for all our fans across the country at one time and decided that a PPV is a great way to make that happen."

Many artists consider this mother and daughter influential for promoting their careers with the Josie Music Awards.

The Josie Music Awards is the largest, multi-genre, privately-owned, independent music award show globally, bringing in thousands from around the world to celebrate each year. The JMAs is also the greatest place for networking, collaborations, and finding lifelong musical friendships.

The Josie Music Awards began after years of Josie and Tinamarie working with thousands of music artists by interviewing them on their radio talk show, The Josie Show, and other shows hosted by Josie and produced by Tinamarie. They also played these artists music on their radio station, Country Blast Radio. Josie grew up working in the radio business, starting her own show at the age of fourteen years old. Tinamarie, being a manager, took on the management role of the business forming the daughter and mother super

team. Another outlet from the Josie Network of brands also includes IndiesVoice Magazine.

Tinamarie and Josie are both CMA voting members as well as members of an advisory panel that rates commercial Country radio music. Tinamarie was also the 'Center Director of the Year' for three years along with the NAEYC Accreditation (National Association for the Education of Young Children), and Achievement Awards included 'Outstanding Teambuilding' and 'Outstanding Quality.'

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

American Country Network, a New Music-Focused Channel Coming in 2024

A new Nashville-based national Country music television network is slated to launch in early 2024, Billboard can exclusively reveal.

Former The Country Network CEO Tommy Snyder and 8 Track Entertainment president Noah Gordon are spearheading the new initiative, named American Country Network (ACN). Snyder will serve as CEO and Gordon as chief creative director.

The network's programming will include Country music and country lifestyle-themed content including movies, lifestyle shows and documentaries, as well as Country music videos from both established artists and newcomers. The network also aims

as well as Country music videos from ad newcomers. The network also aims to have branded music charts to track the popularity of the music videos airing on the network.

"We want to play great music and engage fans who love Country music - and that includes genres such as Americana, Folk, and Bluegrass," Gordon tells Billboard.

In addition to over-the-air broadcast, the privately funded American Country Network will launch a streaming platform to include ROKU, Sling TV, LG TV, STIRR, Freebie TV, Amazon TV, Apple TV, IOS, and Android.

The American Country Network is set to soon open a studio in the Nashville area, providing a central hub for programming creation. "It will broadcast in about 40 major markets and you can consume it in many ways- iPad, cell phone, smart TV, video on demand," Gordon says. "We also think there is value in licensing some content and

potentially kind of refurbishing it - some content that on its own wouldn't be something people would consume, but if we wrap it with a best-of, or a best-moments that fits together."

Johnathon, David McLean, and Bluegrass band of the year: The Also leading the company's launch are chief information Farm Hands. She has also performed in Nashville, on national TV, officer Keith Chester, who has nearly three decades of

entertainment industry experience, including managing and producing artists, actors and television personalities, and Jeff Goodwin, a marketing industry exec with four decades of experience, will serve as American Country Network's marketing director.

In addition to his previous role as CEO of The Country Network, Snyder previously worked alongside late Country Music Hall of Fame member Charlie Daniels, and wrote songs recorded by Country music artists as well as for movies and television. Producer-engineer Gordon has produced music including Dan Tyminski's "God Fearin' Heathen" album. He currently helms 8 Track Entertainment, an Alabama-based company that comprises a sports and entertainment management division, a music production and publishing entity, a television/film division, and a record label, which is distributed by Warner Bros./ADA.



The network will mark a reunion of sorts for Gordon, Snyder, and Brock, bringing The Chad Brock Show from its former home at The Country Network to the American Country Network. The show will exclusively air on ACN as one of the first originally produced shows on the new network, and airing bi-weekly following its launch.

"Also among the shows in the works are The Producer's Chair, a segment based on a long-running

show once held at Nashville's Douglas Corner, that will highlight the producers and songwriters behind many top Country hits." Gordon also noted children's programming for Saturdays, while Sunday Revival with Marty Raybon is slated for Sundays, led by the group Shenandoah's lead singer. They have hopes to launch an awards show that will air on the American Country Network at some point.

American Country Network will join a slate of Country music and/or rural lifestyle-focused networks, including RFD-TV (which launched in 2000), the Paramount-owned CMT (which launched in 1995) and the Circle Media/Opry Entertainment Group-owned Circle Network, which launched in 2020.

Gordon says of their plans to differentiate American Country Network from competitors, "Circle Network has the Grand Ole Opry and a bunch of wonderful programming. My hope is that we can become a network that is a great - not alternative - but kind of a sister network. If you like what you see there, you are probably going to find some things you love on ACN. And nothing against reality shows or anything, but going back, especially if you were a fan of CMT when it first came out, we want to have another great option for promoting and exposing music videos - both current and older fan favorites. I'm hoping to have the best of both worlds in how we deliver music."

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
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

Jones connected with Concerts 4 A Cause, a non-profit that works to bring hope and inspiration through music, to help facilitate the fundraiser. "Concerts 4 A Cause was established to do this very thing," said Josh Bleidt, Concerts 4 A Cause Founder. "We raise money and help those in need through music events and the artists' giving hearts. Today, we are helping two families of law enforcement. Tomorrow it may be a veteran or a child. We are happy we can do our part by bringing some financial relief to these families."

Upon hearing of the shooting, Jones immediately wanted to utilize the high-profile tribute concert, Still Playin' Possum: Music & Memories of George Jones, planned for April 25, 2023, to honor her late husband and her connections within the music industry to raise money in support of both officers and their families. Guitars autographed by Brad Paisley, Trace Adkins, Wynonna, Dierks Bentley, The Oak Ridge Boys, Travis Tritt, Tanya Tucker, Jelly Roll, and many others were sold through the fundraiser. Additionally, a pair of front-row tickets to the concert were auctioned off with support provided by 93.3 NASH Icon.

"I am beyond thankful for the friendships I have with so many artists who agreed to sign guitars to help raise this money," said Nancy Jones. "Everyone did their part, and we did the right thing here. I hope this money will help these families not have to worry about some of the day-to-day bills that put a burden on you when you are dealing with health and tragic situations."

Police Chief Kirk Giles accepted the fundraiser proceeds of more than \$80,000 on behalf of Officer Albert Morin and fallen Officer Garrett Crumby's family. 

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



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The ultimate Loretta Lynn tribute show featuring EMILY PORTMAN as Loretta Lynn with The Coalminers

"Always Loretta" is a tribute show authorized by the Loretta Lynn family that includes all the greatest hits and shares intimate stories of Loretta's life through the eyes of those who knew her best. Loretta Lynn's band, The Coalminers, is joined by the talented Emily Portman who pays tribute to the Queen of Country Music in song.

After the unfortunate passing of Loretta Lynn on October 4, 2022, Emily Portman connected with Loretta's longtime backup band, The Coalminers. They agreed to join talents and collaborate to honor the memory and music of this true Country music trailblazer with "Always Loretta."

The main singing in church and learning to read music as a member of her high school band. Inspired by her parents' music, her influences were an amalgamation of Classic Country and Classic Rock, with a little '80s music mixed in. In college, she joined a choral group, learned the guitar, and began performing professionally at the Corydon Jamboree on the border in neighboring Indiana. However, when she covered the music of Loretta Lynn, people took notice.

She was told from an early age she sounded a lot like the Country music legend. She became a student of her artistry and pored over the singer's entire catalogue of music and began working to emulate Loretta's vocal style and her onstage mannerisms. In the summer of 2004, Emily entered a "Sing Like" contest at the Kentucky Opry and won \$1,000 for her portrayal of Loretta.

portraying her in some shows like variety/Hee Haw type shows for fun. I played Kitty Wells in the beginning because they had a Loretta Lynn girl. I got this gig at the Little Nashville Opry in Brown County Indiana. They would have the local acts on Friday and the big acts on Saturday. Lincoln Hamilton, who ran the theatre, invited me to meet Loretta Lynn. He knew I was a huge fan and made the arrangements. We arrived and they had caution tape around her bus with a big crowd of people standing around. Mr. Hamilton escorted me around to the venue, to the side of the bus where no one was standing. I remember looking up those bus steps with LL wrote beautifully in cursive and the mirror ceiling. I turned and saw Loretta standing there like she had been waiting on me. She stood there with her hands folded and she said, 'They told me you were coming so I went back there and brushed my teeth!' My anxieties went right up into the clouds. I felt

performing a Loretta Lynn song on YouTube, she was discovered by Michael Twitty (eldest son of the great Conway Twitty) who cast her to portray Loretta in the nationally touring musical "It's Only Make Believe." The musical was instrumental in establishing Portman's career. Over the next two decades, her portrayal of the Coal Miner's Daughter would carry to the most prestigious stages (including the Ryman Auditorium and the Grand Ole Opry), where she would rub shoulders with some of the biggest names in the business, including George Jones, Archie Campbell, Vern Gosdin, Toby Keith, Chris Cagle, and even Loretta Lynn, herself, with whom she formed a close friendship.

Emily shares about the "Always Loretta" show and her friendship with Loretta: "This a dream come true for me. I never dreamed I would get to do this. I always enjoy singing. Many told me that I sang like Loretta Lynn which led to me her."

Just a couple years later, after posting a video of herself like I was among my very best friend. That was my first encounter with her. There was a lady sitting on the couch. She said, 'Loretta this is Emily.' I had met her at Loretta's ranch. I was looking for words to one of Loretta's songs because there were a couple of lines I didn't know. This lady on the bus was Betty and I asked did she have the words. She said sure and wrote all the words down and I learned it. She told Loretta about the song, and she told me the story about the song and sang it with me. There was a newspaper article from my hometown in Grayson County, Kentucky. The editor put me on the front page with my guitar and cowboy hat and it was titled, 'You Lookin' At Country.' It was about singing like Loretta Lynn, even though I had my own sound it compared me to her. I gave her a copy of the article. She said, 'Well honey, you look Like me in that picture. I'm gonna read it when we go down the road.' That was my first time meeting

Emily made frequent trips to Loretta Lynn's Ranch in Hurricane Mills, Tennessee. If you ever saw the performers together, two the connection they shared was obvious. Emily remembers a conversation the two ladies shared. "Loretta told me one time, 'Honey, I got me one of them Apples. I seen you singin' my songs.' I said, Loretta I hope you don't mind. She said, 'Honey, I think it's great. I used to be Kitty Wells!"

"Over the years, I got to visit with her," Emily continues. "There were some instances that she could read my mind. She would look at me and say, 'Honey we got a real connection, don't we?' It was almost spiritual; we had a close intimate bond like she was a close relative. It was like a gift that God gave me to carry on what she has left us. Everybody is given gifts and qualities and sometimes they don't discover it as a gift from God. This gift

brought me up, and I am glad to be a part of this production."

Dave Thornhill was a part of the Coalminers Band for 55 vears. When Loretta's husband died, the Coalminers were let go of their duties. Dave shares, "We did a reunion concert in 2013. I was working with the Sherriff's Department in 2017 when Loretta called and said, 'Can you play? My guitar player can't play for two weeks due to a family emergency. I said, 'When do I start?' She said, 'Tonight!' I worked with her the last two weeks before she had her stroke. My first engagement with Loretta was 1967 and my last was 2017."

Dave shares more insight and special moments with Loretta and the Coalminers Band. "One thing that the public doesn't realize was Mooney (Loretta's husband, also known as Doo) called all the shots. He was boss over everything in the business. I would go to Loretta about different things, and she'd say, 'Well honey, you will have to ask Doo.' I would have a conference with Doo and tell Loretta this is what we're doing. That was the way we operated."

"We played concerts in fifty states, eight provinces in Canada, and thirty foreign countries," Dave continues. "You can't name a place we haven't been. There are a few that stand out in my mind. We did Wembley Festival in London for five years in a row. It held 40.000 people. Then one 4th of July we were booked to play under the Arch of St. Louis, Missouri. There were half a million people sitting along the river there. That was the biggest crowd I ever seen anywhere."

When asked how it felt performing together with Emily, Dave replied. "It is like starting again in 1967, except Emily knows all of Loretta's songs! In the beginning, Loretta only had six or eight songs recorded back then. We played the hit records with cover songs. Of course, then she recorded several





albums and ended up with 600 songs. Our problem is we have forty songs we want to do and can't do all of them! Playing with Emily reminds us of playing with Loretta from day one. When we first got together over a year ago, I had a get together with the Coalminers Band for a jam session. When our friends got together, I had to rent a theater to get everyone in for our jam session. I called Emily and asked her to come sing four or five Loretta songs with the Coalminers. She came down and sang them great and the audience flipped out over it. We got together and said wouldn't it be great for the Coalminers and Emily to have some shows together. Well, it snowballed into what it is now." The "Always Loretta" show has been on a successful tour in 2023 with dates coming in for 2024.

"The "Always Emily says, Loretta" show is very special. I can

was because of Loretta, my parents, and everybody that always connect with people in the audience and at meet and greets. The people respond to the show and reminisce, going back in time because the stories that are told and we present. A memory that stands out, we were at the Troubadour Theatre in Nashville and the Lynn and Twitty families were there. That was a real experience. I might have been a little nervous but when I got to the stage it was like an old friend."

> The mother of six children, Emily and her family lives in South Central Kentucky. She says, "I love to sing! I like to write but I haven't done a lot on a record yet. I stay occupied with my family and the show. I love to work with horses and kids. I also teach school on the side. I love my family and have a supportive husband who works hard. He is my 'Doo' I guess!"

> About three weeks before Loretta passed, her twin daughter Patsy called Dave Thornhill, stating Loretta wanted to see him. Dave recalls, "I called Bob Hempker. Bob went to work for Loretta after I did. Ken Riley became her road manager in 1975. I told them I was going to see Loretta, and they went with me. We walked in and Loretta was sitting on the couch. She gave us a hug and kiss. We sat there and shot the breeze and had a great time. Her mind was as sharp as a tack, and she was bringing up stuff that happened on the road 45 years ago. We all laughed and were having a grand time. I finally told Loretta that the Coalminer's Band and Emily Portman were rehearsing for the shows of her music. Loretta said, 'I tell you one thing, you better be rehearsing for my show. I'm getting ready to go back out on the road!' Of course, we all knew that would never happen. She was so happy we were doing her music. I made her a vow that we would carry on her music as such as we could. We got to

spend three hours with her and said our goodbyes, and that Dennis Digby was it."

Dave is writing a book about his travels and experience with Loretta. "Down through the years I have been approached to write a book. I am writing a book from the first time I seen her through the last three weeks of her life. "55 Years - I was associated with Loretta Lynn" is expected to release in 2024.

Dave Thornhill (Lead Guitar, Bandleader)

Thornhill's first performance with Loretta Lynn was in 1967 as the lead guitarist for The Country Playboys. The group served as the band for countless nationally touring Country artists (Jim Ed Brown, Little Jimmy Dickens, Lynn Anderson, Merle Travis, Carl Smith, including

Loretta Lynn, who told the audience, "I've played all over the world, and this is the only band that did all my stuff just like the record. If I could ever afford a band, this is the only band I'd like to have." Two years later, she hired all five musicians and her band. The Coalminers, was formed. Dave would serve as guitarist and bandleader for Loretta Lynn for 55 years (until 2017) and played over 10,000 shows with her (including her duet shows with the great Conway Twitty and serving as the band that backed Sissy Spacek in the movie "The Coal Miner's Daughter"). Now, in his 80s, Thornhill is thrilled to renew his role as bandleader and lead guitarist for the Lynn family authorized tribute show "Always Loretta," to extend the legacy of Loretta and his band, The Coalminers.

Digby would perform alongside an impressive list of legendary performers, including Tex Ritter, Charlie Louvin, David Houston, Cal Smith, and the Osborne Brothers. He would join The Coalminers in 1982 and perform with Loretta Lynn for over seventeen years.

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

ichael Ray Fain was drawn to music at an early age while watching his family in the backyard picking and singing. He recalls, "I knew that's what I wanted to do. I recall singing Hank Williams, Sr. songs and being able to appreciate his writing even in my early teens. It didn't bother me that my friends weren't into Hank at that time. I thought he was cool, and I still do!"

Michael credits, "Performing in church, getting to know and respect the art of making music with artists at all levels, and living life is what gives us something to write about, has shaped me into who I am."

Fain says he could name a list a mile long of his musical influences. "Merle Haggard, George Jones, Don Williams, Randy Travis, and Alan Jackson are at the top of list of artists that have influenced me."

One of Michael's career highlights so far has been performing at the Star Theatre to a sold out, hometown crowd in Stuart, Virginia. He was privileged to have Redd Volkaert sitting in with the band, who also played guitar for Merle Haggard.

The recently signed Grace Records Nashville artist has released his latest project of original material, "Rye's N Shine." His current single, *America, I Love* was released to radio. The song is deeply rooted in Americana, faith, family and freedom.



"Sometimes the mind and heart disagree, but still, choices have to be made," reflects Fain. "On a country backroad, Clint Black's *A Better Man* came across the air waves. I'd heard the song a hundred times before. I made a choice to take a different path in life because on that one particular day, Clint was singing for me. We all have to make choices at some point. Some work out, some don't. Be thankful for the ones that do and learn to live with ones that don't. Life is a lesson but it's also a blessing! With each new day comes the opportunity to be better than we were yesterday."

Michael Ray has a passion to write and perform his music to reach hearts that have a need to feel something more than beats. He shares what a fan can experience at his shows. "Expect to be treated like family while listening to original honest Country music as well as covers from some of Country music's greatest. I want fans to not only hear the music, but to feel it and leave the event feeling better than when they arrived."

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Christian Country artist Bill Baker believes and writes what he sings. The Oklahoma native is the front man for his band, Bill Baker & Country 3:16. Bill shares the inspiration behind his latest single, *Used To Be's*.

Bill got the idea for this song from his bandmate. "I wrote this song after I got a phone call from my pedal steel player, Tory Sweatman. He asked me if I'd heard a particular Country song and said we needed something with that same kind of feel to it. I happened to have a copy of that song and listened to it. A few days went by and I was driving down the road when the words and melody started coming to me so I pulled over and wrote it. Got home, grabbed a guitar, and that was that. It sounds nothing like the song he had in mind, but the song had that same feel."

"The words to *Used To Be's* are a little touch and go lyrically speaking," he adds. "I think sometimes we forget church people have issues too. We get so busy singing shouting songs, praise and worship music, that we don't sing gut check songs! This song does that, it calls people out and says here's the answer to your problems or issue, whatever word you want to use to describe it. It gets past the Sunday best and gets down to business."

Bill Baker & Country 3:16 has done outreach ministry both in the rodeo world and helping churches with community events. He says, "I have found this song to work in arenas, Saturday night events, and Sunday morning services. It's a great anthem and depicts what Bill Baker and Country 3:16 is all about - souls saved!"

craig morgan GOD, FAMILY, COUNTRY

Husband, father, man of faith, Country music star, and Army veteran - Craig Morgan re-enlists in the U.S. Army Reserve. He says, "I'm an American country boy who loves his country, his family and his God, and all of those things collectively dictate who I am."

fter twenty years as a successful chart-topping Country music performer and songwriter, Craig released his latest album aptly entitled, "God, Family, Country." The album contains several new songs with some of the most powerful tracks he's ever recorded, including *That's What I Love About Sunday, Almost Home*, and *God, Family, Country*. Craig has also released an

autobiography of the same title. He has released Country radio classics like the four-week number one hit, *That's What I Love About Sunday*, the smash party anthem *Redneck Yacht Club*, and their fellow fan favorites *International Harvester*, *Little Bit of Life, Touch*, and *This Ain't Nothin'*.

Craig and his family have also known great loss: the death of their son Jerry in 2016. Instead of snuffing out Craig's artistry, however, the unimaginable tragedy led to him writing his most stunning song to date, *The Father, My Son and the Holy Ghost*. The achingly personal ballad topped the iTunes all-genre sales charts and is the centerpiece of both, "God, Family, Country" and of Craig's story itself. From the artist's official website, Craig shared about the song on the album. "It's a very tough song to sing, and sometimes I can't even look at people when I perform it, but it's amazing to know what God has done, and how He has used something so traumatic in my life for good."

Craig has always recognized a good song when he hears accomp one. On "God, Family, Country," he offers his version of Army."



Gavin DeGraw's *Soldier*. "I heard Gavin sing that and thought, 'Dang, that is my song,'" Craig says. "It truly exemplifies the personality and the character of a soldier, and I just had to record it. This album is based on everything that's happened in my life and my career." Other songs on the "God Family Country" Deluxe Edition include, *How You Make A Man, I May Drink A little, Ask Him*, and *Sounds Like Home*.

As a veteran, Morgan spent seventeen years in the Army and Army Reserve, serving the 101st and 82nd Airborne Divisions as an E-6 Staff Sergeant and Fire Support Specialist. Since then, he's remained an avid supporter of all of our service members. And now, he's stepping up to serve alongside them once again.

On Saturday, July 29, 2023, during an appearance at the Grand Ole Opry, Morgan was once again sworn into the U.S. Army Reserve, where he'll be assigned to Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama as a Staff Sergeant and Warrant Officer candidate. His swearing in was performed by General Andrew Poppas, Commander of the U.S. Army Forces Command: "No matter who you are or where you're from, service in the United States Army is a unique, life-changing honor. Every Soldier who enters the Army has the opportunity to become the best version of themselves and Staff Sgt. Morgan is no exception. I look forward to seeing what he accomplishes and how he impacts other soldiers around the Army."

Craig said while he loves being a Country artist, his greatest honor is serving with our men and women in uniform: "I'm excited to once again serve my country and be all I can

be in hopes of encouraging others to be a part of something greater than ourselves. God bless America. Go Army."

"I realized that there's so much that I've missed - the friends, the feeling of the sense of accomplishment," Morgan said in a video explaining his decision. "I realized that I've missed it so much and I truly believe that I still have more to give."

Morgan has been a frequent presence at concerts for troops for years, performing in Afghanistan, Iraq and more recently at the Army garrison in Grafenwöhr, Germany, in December. "He's always out there, he visits soldiers everywhere, whether it's in the states, overseas," said Poppas, who administered the oath of service to Morgan. "I've seen him in combat locations and he's always engaging, he's always entertaining and he's always inspiring those that have put themselves in harm's way. He's a hell of a patriot."

Morgan will continue touring and releasing music while serving in the Army Reserve. He has begun his dual career as a musician and warrant officer. "Haven't sung in uniform in a long time," Morgan said during the Nashville concert, before launching into a song dedicated to his fellow soldiers.

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The Music & Legacy of JAN HOWARD

One of the Grand Ladies of the Grand Ole Opry, Jan Howard was undoubtedly a lady of rare talent and determination who challenged life on a daily basis. Classy, sophisticated and compassionate are words used to describe this Country legend.

Grand Ole Opry member Jan Howard was born March 13, 1929, in West Plains, Missouri. As mentioned on her website, Jan was the eighth of eleven children of an impoverished farm couple. Her humble roots included attending a one-room schoolhouse wearing the homemade, feed sack clothes of a rural Depression-era child.

Jan married at the age of fifteen and had three sons before the age of twenty. After dealing with two divorces, she moved to Los Angeles, California in 1955 and worked as a waitress and a secretary. While living in L.A. she met an aspiring songwriter, Harlan Howard. The couple married in Las Vegas a month later.

One evening while Jan was washing dishes, Harlan came into the room and heard her singing for the very first time. Harlan persuaded Jan to make a demo tape of his song, *Mommy For A Day*, which became a hit for Kitty Wells. Jan later sang demos for other artists like Tex Ritter, Buck Owens, and others. She also recorded the original demo of the Patsy Cline classic, *I Fall To Pieces*. Backed by Wynn Stewart's band, Jan released Harlan's *Pick Me Up On Your Way Down* in 1959. She also recorded several duets with Wynn Stewart.

Jan scored her first solo Top Ten hit with *The One You Slip Around With* in 1960. That same year, the Howards moved to Nashville and Jan made her first appearance on the Grand Ole Opry.

Jan was painfully shy and suffered from the psychological scars of her youth, as well as the anxiety of beginning a new adventure. She went into therapy to help cope with these anxieties. Her fans found her blunt, no-nonsense manner and stylish, no-frills look appealing. She won Billboard Magazine's 'Most Promising Country Female' Award in 1960, and she brought feminine spunk to The Nashville Sound.

In 1963, Jan had a Top 40 hit with I Wish I Was A Single Jan performed in response to several requests. Four years after Girl Again. A couple years later Jan's career really caught Jimmy's death in Vietnam, Jan's youngest son David



fire. She released a string of gutsy hit songs in the 60s and 70s including *What Makes A Man Wander, Evil On Your Mind, Bad Seed, Roll Over And Play Dead, Count Your Blessings Woman, We Had All The Good Things Going, Rock Me Back To Little Rock, Love Is Like A Spinning Wheel,* and *Let Him Have It.* Several of Jan's songs reflected her troubled marriage with her husband, which ended in a 1968 divorce.

For the first time in her life, Jan's singing became an economic necessity. Between 1965 and 1973, Jan and fellow Grand Ole Opry member, Bill Anderson formed one of Country's hottest duos on the road, on his syndicated TV show, and on record. Their hits included *I Know You're Married, If It's All The Same To You,* and *Someday We'll Be Together*. Jan and Bill's 1967 recording of *For Loving You* stayed at No. 1 for four weeks on the Country singles chart.

Jan was a gifted songwriter. She penned the 1966 Kitty Wells hit *It's All Over But The Crying* and Bill Anderson's 1970 hit, *Love Is A Sometimes Thing*, as well as her own singles *Marriage Has Ruined More Good Love Affairs* (1971) and *The Life Of A Country Singer* (1981). Jan and Bill co-wrote Connie Smith's hit *I Never Once Stopped Loving You.* Together with Jan's son Carter, they co-wrote their own 1972 hit *Dis-Satisfied*.

Jan's proudest composition is 1968's *My Son*, a moving recitation that began as a letter to her son in Vietnam. Her plea for the safe return of her son Jimmy had been released for two weeks when he was killed. Thousands of letters from soldiers and their parents subsequently poured in to Jan. Recent world events had renewed interest in the song, which Jan performed in response to several requests. Four years after Jimmy's death in Vietnam, Jan's youngest son David

committed suicide. Jan softened the edges of tragedy with her strong faith in God and her belief that there is a reason for everything.

In 1987, Jan released her candid, compelling, and bestselling autobiography titled 'Sunshine and Shadow.' The outline for the book was actually a song called *My Story* which Jan composed during a low point in her life. "Never Let Yesterday Use Up Today" has been one of Jan's mottos for years. "You can't change the past," she explains, "so learn from it, cherish the good, and go on from there. This is not a rehearsal; this is the show and there are no retakes."

Throughout her career Jan accumulated many accolades for her recordings and songwriting, including several Grammy and CMA nominations. She received countless acknowledgements for her charitable contributions and took an active role working with Veterans groups across the United States. In West Plains, Missouri, the "Jan Howard Expressway" has been named in her honor. In 2005, she joined the Missouri Country Music Hall of Fame.

From 1960 through 1978, Jan placed thirty singles on the Billboard Country music charts. Her vocals can be heard on over twenty albums. A boxed set collection containing eighty songs and a twenty-page photo album was also released. Jan toured every state in the USA, along with twenty-one foreign countries. She made numerous television appearances on dozens of shows like Hee Haw, Family Feud, The Today Show, Nashville Now, Opry Live, and many more.

Jan Howard passed away on March 28, 2020, in Gallatin, Tennessee at age 91. She became a member of the Grand Ole Opry on March 27, 1971. For over thirty years she was a regular performer and a fan favorite on the Opry stage. "Jan Howard was a force of nature in Country music, at the Opry, and in life," Grand Ole Opry Vice President and Executive Producer Dan Rogers said in a statement. "We were all so lucky so many nights to hear her voice on stage and to catch up with her backstage. We're all better for having had her in our lives."


It's safe to say that few people have been through as many hardships and heartbreaks as Jan Howard. When someone once suggested to her that she'd make a good soap opera actress, Jan laughed and replied, "My life has been a soap opera."

Jan had the gift of communicating the emotions of life through her music. Her love of life touched everyone she encountered. She once stated, "It almost seems like an accident that I became a singer, but I'm so thankful for it."

So are we all. Thank you, Jan Howard for the music and the legacy that will continue for generations. Jan Howard truly was a Grand Lady!





2021 would bring a new project, "A Better Place," and their very first radio release entitled, *Where Could I Go?* Now charting is another release from the project entitled, *Ain't No Grave.* In addition to radio Simple Gifts (The Sawyer Family Band) has a television show, "The Simple Gifts Show" with 26 episodes recorded. Treatment has been difficult, but as David describes, "The Lord has shown Himself in so many ways. The doctors allowed chemo on Mondays with the hope Kathy could sing over the weekends. She did not miss an opportunity that was within three hours of home. Even without traditional insurance, astronomical bills have been paid. The power of prayer has become such a real thing as the saints have lifted the family up day after day. Though the battle continues, Kathy feels healthy and is now able to participate fully in the family schedule."

Success is an understatement when it comes to the awards this family band has achieved. Too numerous to list them all, here are just a few highlights: Inspirational Country Music Association's 'Bluegrass Band of the Year,' Two- time recipient of the International Western Music Association 'Group Harmony Award,' World Fiddling Champion – Junior Division (Leah), Texas State Fiddle Champion – Freshman Division (Leah), Academy of Western Artists 'Young Artist Award' (David, son), International Western Music Association 'Crescendo (Rising Star) Award' (David, son), International Western Music Association 'Male Yodeler of the Year' (David, dad), and Indiana State Fair Old Time Fiddler Champion (David, dad).




